### **Community Profile: Tay Valley Township**

Tay Valley Township, in the heart of Lanark County, is a community rich in history, agriculture, and natural beauty. Known for its farming heritage and historic buildings, the township also features two Provincial Parks—Murphys Point and Silver Lake—dedicated to conservation and education.

With a permanent population of 5,925 (2021 census) and a seasonal population exceeding 10,000, Tay Valley is poised for growth, expecting over 2,000 new residents in the next 25 years. This expansion offers opportunities to shape the community while preserving its unique character.

Outdoor recreation is central to Tay Valley's appeal. With 31 lakes, eight rivers, and numerous trails and campgrounds, residents and visitors enjoy year-round activities like paddling, fishing, and hiking. Tourism is a key economic driver, attracting over 100,000 visitors annually and generating \$7.7 million for the local economy.

The township hosts vibrant cultural events, including Art in the Garden at Kiwi Gardens, which showcases local artists amid floral displays every Father's Day weekend. The Festival of the Maples, held the last weekend of April, celebrates the maple sap harvest with food, music, and awards recognizing top syrup producers.

Tay Valley's history extends beyond European settlement. The Algonquin/Omàmìwininì People lived on this land for centuries, maintaining a deep connection to nature. In recognition of this history, two plaques were installed in 2021 by Lanark County Neighbours for Truth and Reconciliation in collaboration with Algonquin elders.

As Tay Valley grows, it continues to balance progress with heritage, offering a mix of adventure, culture, and reflection for residents and visitors alike.

#### **Youth Unemployment**



In response to a weak summer job market, the federal government is expanding the Canada Summer Jobs program with an additional \$25 million to create 6,000 more jobs, on top of the planned 70,000. Statistics Canada indicates that nearly 20% of returning students aged 15 to 24 were unemployed in May, the highest rate outside the pandemic since 2009. This reflects broader economic challenges, including job losses in manufacturing, low vacancy rates, and limited labor mobility, which hinder opportunities for young Canadians despite targeted youth programs.

#### **Manufacturing Decline in Ontario**

In April, manufacturing jobs decreased by 31,000 (-1.6%), with Ontario facing the largest decline due to trade uncertainty with the U.S. Wholesale and retail trade also fell by 27,000 (-0.9%). However, these sectors remained stable year-over-year. Conversely, public administration gained 37,000 jobs (+3.0%), mainly from temporary positions related to the federal election. Additionally, finance, insurance, real estate, rental, and leasing employment rose by 24,000 (+1.6%), continuing steady growth since October 2024.






President Trump doubled steel and aluminum tariffs to 50%, citing unfair foreign competition. Canada condemned the move as "unlawful," and Prime Minister Carney confirmed negotiations and potential retaliations. Industry leaders warn of job cuts, higher costs, and economic harm, prompting unions and opposition to demand quick action. Ontario Premier Ford and others call for matching tariffs and stronger domestic protections.

Canadian travel to the U.S. dropped again in May, with car trips down 38.1% and air travel down 24.2% year-over-year. Airlines are cutting U.S. flights as demand shifts to domestic and overseas destinations.








These graphs show the highest paying industries according to a place of work status at the 2-digit NAICS classification in Renfrew and Lanark Counties.


#### **HIGHEST PAYING INDUSTRY**






These graphs show the highest paying industries according to a place of work status at the 2-digit NAICS classification in Renfrew and Lanark Counties.
